

Saturday began with an extravagant breakfast buffet of veggies, meats, breads




and fruits for the event overnighters. The remainder of the morning evaporated in a haze of beach walks and harbor cruises, complete with numerous dolphin sightings.



A great weekend? Absolutely! Please join us in congratulating hosts Debra and Elliot Wainer for organizing such a fantastic event!




the SNACKLEBOX

This issue we're going to tackle the Snacklebox. Every boat needs a tacklebox, right? Maybe not. SGYC members that fish are few in number. Truth be told, we don't even have that many cruisers, but Duffy boats we have in abundance - it

almost seems like two per household, and how do we use them? We mosey the local waters at a snail's pace, while guzzling, grazing and gossiping. This sometimes presents a problem, because it's hard to get a proper assortment of snacks on a tiny table surrounded by swiveling guests. The solution is the Snacklebox!

A Snacklebox is simply a compartmented tray where sweet, savory, crunchy and creamy can live side-by-side in independent compartments. The best ones operate like a lazy Susan, and have a snap-on lid with handles.

Though Snacklebox is a trademarked name, other companies make similar products that streamline your trip down the ramp and get you out and running just as fast. Here's a great option from Target; it comes in three colors, and is just waiting for you to add munchies and pair it with your favorite Proseco or other non-staining beverage for another buzz around the bay.





Mister Tech Tip

Mr. Tech Tip attempts to answer your questions about boat mechanical maintenance and repair

Q: How long are my Duffy Batteries going to last? When they go, can I replace them with Lithium Batteries like my eBike has?

A: Duffy says batteries typically last over 800 cycles, the lifespan depending on many factors. If you use your boat twice each week that's 400 weeks, or a little over 7 years, consistent with most owners' experience. Can you make them last longer? Probably. Check water levels monthly, twice in summer months. Top them off using a filler jug that stops automatically when full. Get a hydrometer and learn to use it, then check each cell of each battery. Do all this using proper safety equipment and methods.

Replacing your batteries with modern ones has tradeoffs.

Expect to pay considerably more for the following advantages:
longer life, faster charging and possibly longer cruises. On the other hand, Lithium batteries are so much lighter that you will probably have to add hundreds of pounds of ballast for your boat to sit properly again.

Shirley maintains an inventory to satisfy people all along their musical journey, from collectors to casual observers, novices to professionals, song writers to simple beach lovers, but Island Bazaar is more than just ukuleles... they offer private and group



lessons, instrument repair and upgrades, strum groups, jam circles and meet-ups, workshops and special events. Here is where so many have discovered a hidden talent, deepened their appreciation for island inspired music, created lasting connections and forged close friendships.

Shirley, your eagerness to organize a waterfront concert for us shows you love your community as much as your music. We are so very grateful to get to know you.

Medical Moments with Dr. Mark

Ganglion Cysts

Paul asks, "I have a lump on my wrist from when a wrench slipped while working on the diesel engine of my boat. It doesn't hurt, but it's slowly getting bigger. What is it? What can I do about it? And should I be concerned?"

Answer: It sounds like a ganglion cyst, which is a non-cancerous lump, often from the lubricating glands of the synovial sheath covering tendons or joints. The word "ganglion" originates from the ancient Greek word for "knot" or "swelling under the skin." It usually excysts(exists) without causing pain, unless it presses on a nerve or interferes with joint movement. Regardless of pain, it should always be seen by a physician. Repetitive movement or injury to the tendon or joint can cause inflammation or irritation, which can cause the gland to get capped off or clogged and accumulate the clear "KY Jelly" type lubricating fluid forming the cyst.

The diagnosis is made clinically by examination as it is soft tissue and usually X-rays won't show it. An MRI will show it, but this is a more expensive test. Ultrasound can confirm that it is a liquid-filled cyst and not a solid tumor.

Treatment should be started sooner rather than later as it is easier to treat when it is smaller. No matter the size, it should be treated. 40 years ago, we used to treat it by banging it with a large medical textbook, trying to rupture it. That is why the nickname for ganglion cysts is called the "Bible cyst." Now, treatment con-cysts(consists) of either draining it, anti-inflammatory cortisone injection, or surgically removing it. All of these are done outpatient, painlessly under local anesthesia and rarely require general anesthesia unless the cyst is very large and extensive. Re-cyst(resist) the temptation to bang it with a bible at home. If you are already planning to or attempting to treat at home, de-cyst(dissist).

swelling.

Recovery takes two to six weeks, with mild pain and swelling lasting a few days. Elevation above heart level reduces the Less swelling means less pain, so your physician may incyst(insist) that you keep it elevated p ost-op. Keep the bandage dressing clean and dry for one week postop. Avoid strenuous activities like lifting for four weeks post-op, as these may cause symptoms to per-cyst(persist).

Rehabilitation consists of special range of motion exercises to maintain strength and mobility. Surgery con-cysts(consists) of cutting the cyst out as a last resort if injection and drainage is insufficient, or if recurrence occurs. The incision is small and usually fades in six to twelve months.

Wearing mechanic-style gloves can help prevent ganglion cysts from happening in the first place.

Your family physician would be the best person to contact for more information.



The California Boater Card shows that its holder has successfully taken and passed a state-approved boater safety education examination. As of January 1 2025, all persons who operate a vessel on California waters will be required to have one. To

All Boaters here means All. That means California sailors, power boaters, harbor cruisers, and even Duffy Pilots. Even if you don't own a boat, you might find yourself piloting one some day, so look into getting your Boater Card now.


