FROM THE REAR

Sue and I have had a lot of fun simply messing about in our boat. Here are a few random things I've learned along the way:

- If you run out of gas in your dinghy and have no oars on board, it is possible to paddle half a mile back to the boat hanging over the front and paddling with your hands.
- You should keep oars in your dinghy in case you run out of gas (a backup gas can is also a good idea).
- It is not fun cruising to Avalon in small craft advisory conditions.
- If you do travel to Avalon in small craft advisory conditions and you forget to close your port holes (opened by your nephew when he stayed on the boat a few days earlier), the interior of your boat will get soaked.
- For kids, there is something magical about watching TV on a boat.
- Those converter boxes that came out when TV went digital really improve TV on a boat (more channels; good reception).
- Things left on top of your dock box can blow into the water while you are on a short cruise around the harbor.
- Eisenglass will be permanently damaged if submerged in salt water over night.
- They're called fenders, not bumpers.
- Whatever they're called, if hung just above the water line they don't do much good when you are pulling up to a pier that rises four feet above the water line.
- In Avalon, you moor on a "can" not a "ball."
- The sound of water slapping against the bow can really make it hard to sleep, and ear plugs and several nightcaps don't really help much.
- While on a raft up, stepping from gunwale to gunwale with a plate of pasta in one hand and a margarita in the other can lead to injury.
- It is possible, though not pleasant, to stay overnight on the boat, pack up from the raft up the next day, and cruise from Newport Beach to Huntington Harbour with a broken collar bone.
- It turns out that the galley sink empties right into the water so, I now know not to be surprised when Lucky Charms come floating by after I've done the morning dishes.
- Those cool stainless steel kayak racks that connect to your boat's railing are really expensive.
- Remember to turn off the boat's aft water hose before cruising out to Cat Harbor, otherwise you may have no water on board when you arrive. It is possible to fill up your boat with water in Cat Harbor from the hose at the west dinghy dock if you pull up real close while someone on the dock throws the hose to your wife.
